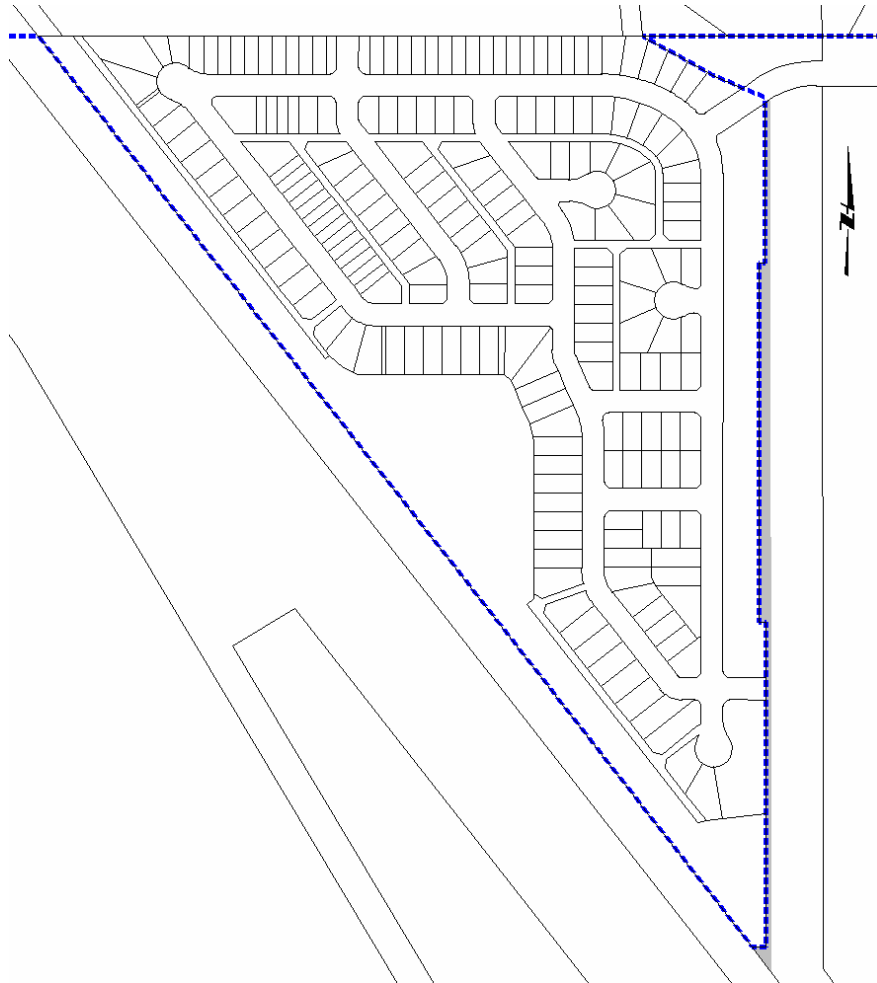

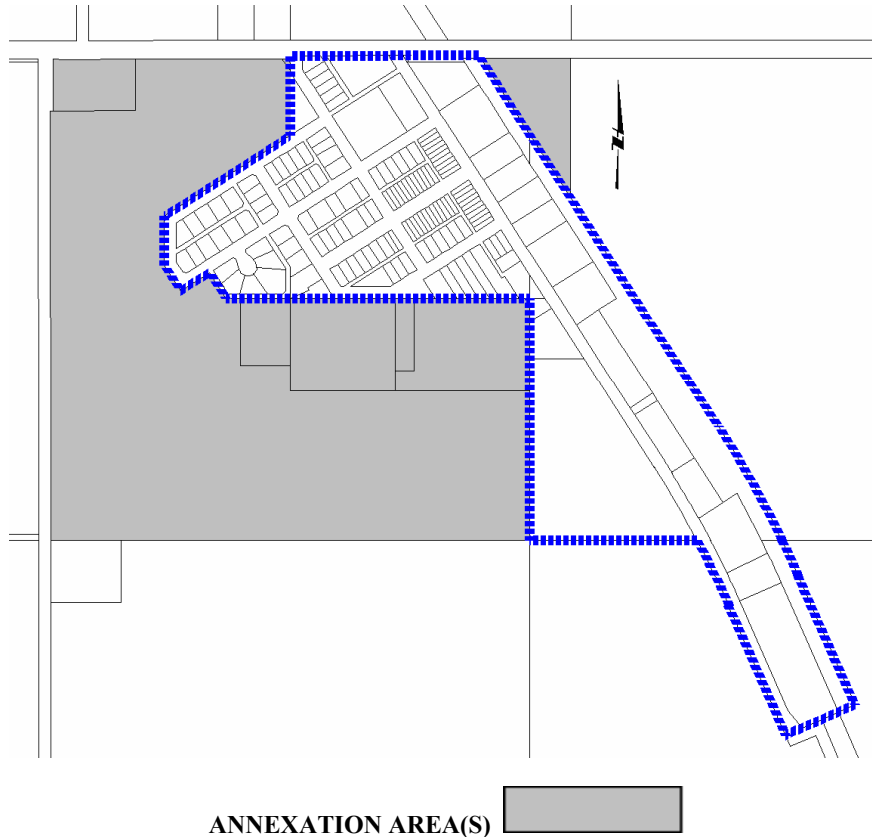

ALL THOSE PORTIONS OF LEGAL SUBDIVISIONS 11, 12 AND 13 IN THE NORTH WEST QUARTER, SECTION 31, TOWNSHIP 18, RANGE 21, WEST OF THE FOURTH MERIDIAN NOT CURRENTLY CONTAINED WITHIN THE BOUNDARY OF THE VILLAGE OF MILO, CONTAINING 44.5 HECTARES (109.96 ACRES) MORE OR LESS, EXCEPTING THEREOUT ROAD PLAN 3380JK AND THE SERVICE ROAD REGISTERED UNDER PLAN 0312190.

LOT 2, BLOCK 2, PLAN 0714226, CONTAINING 1.741 HECTARES (4.3 ACRES) MORE OR LESS.

APPENDIX C

ORDER

1 In this Order, “annexed land” means the land described in Appendix A and shown on the sketch in Appendix B.

2(1) For taxation purposes in the 2010 taxation year and subsequent taxation years up to and including 2014, the annexed land and assessable improvements to it

- (a) must be assessed by the Village of Milo on the same basis as if they had remained in Vulcan County, and

- (b) must be taxed by the Village of Milo in respect of each assessment class that applies to the annexed land and the assessable improvements to it using a rate determined by adding the municipal tax rate established by Vulcan County for property of that class to the applicable percentage under subsection (2) for that taxation year.

(2) For the purposes of subsection (1), the applicable percentage is

- (a) for the 2010 taxation year, 20%,
- (b) for the 2011 taxation year, 40%,
- (c) for the 2012 taxation year, 60%,
- (d) for the 2013 taxation year, 80%, and
- (e) for the 2014 taxation year, 100%

of the difference between the municipal tax rate established by Vulcan County and the municipal tax rate established by the Village of Milo for property of the same class for the same taxation year.

(3) Notwithstanding subsections (1)(b) and (2), if the rate determined under subsection (2) for a taxation year exceeds the Village of Milo's municipal tax rate for the same taxation year, the annexed land and the assessable improvements to it must be taxed at the Village of Milo's municipal tax rate for that taxation year.

3(1) If, in the 2010 taxation year or in any subsequent taxation year up to and including 2014, a portion of the annexed land becomes a new parcel of land created

- (a) as a result of subdivision,
- (b) as a result of separation of title by registered plan of subdivision, or
- (c) by instrument or any other method that occurs at the request of or on behalf of the landowner,

section 2 ceases to apply at the end of that taxation year in respect of that portion of the annexed land and the assessable improvements to it.

(2) If, under this section, section 2 ceases to apply to a portion of the annexed land in a taxation year, that portion of the annexed land and the assessable improvements to it must be assessed and taxed for the purposes of property taxes in the following year in the same manner as other property of the same assessment class in the Village of Milo is assessed and taxed.

Notice of Intent to Designate a Provincial Historic Resource
(Historical Resources Act)

Notice is hereby given that sixty days from the date of service of this Notice and its publication in Alberta Gazette, the Minister of Culture and Community Spirit intends to make an Order that the site known as the:

Donalda Creamery, together with the land legally described as:

Plan 5965AE, Block 1, Lots 13 and 14, excepting thereout all mines and minerals

and municipally located at in the Village of Donalda, Alberta be designated as a **Provincial Historic Resource** under section 20 of the Historical Resources Act, RSA 2000 cH-9.

The reasons for the designation are as follows: The heritage value of the Donalda Creamery lies in its association with the development of the dairy industry in Alberta. It is also significant for its architecture, which is an excellent example of small-scale industrial architecture adapted for use in the dairy industry, and for the equipment it contains, which illustrates changes in dairy-processing technology and procedures.

In 1937, the Donalda Co-operative Creamery Association was formed by local producers and the owner of the existing creamery, which had been established in 1924. Numerous co-operative creameries were established throughout Alberta in the early decades of the twentieth-century. Based on the successful wheat pool and grain co-op ventures, creamery co-ops allowed producers to work together to overcome the challenges presented by their geographic isolation and their economic and political remoteness from the centres of power. The Donalda Creamery produced butter and cream for consumption both locally and throughout the province. Beginning in 1946, the Central Alberta Dairy Pool attempted to absorb the Donalda Creamery, a move reflective of the consolidation of the province's small creameries under the much larger dairy pools. These overtures were resisted, and the Donalda Creamery was one of the few creameries to remain independent during the middle decades of twentieth century.

In the 1950s, rising production and a rapidly deteriorating facility meant that a new and larger creamery was required. In 1954, a gable-roofed machine shop located across the street was purchased and moved onto the creamery's property. The open floor plan of the machine shop was ideally suited for conversion into a creamery. A shed-roofed addition, which would house an office, laboratory and boiler room, was quickly constructed. The former creamery building was torn down and the salvaged lumber was used to construct a two door truck garage. Most of the equipment from the original creamery was transferred to the new facility and new equipment was purchased, giving the Donalda Creamery a collection of dairy processing equipment covering a number of different eras. The creamery continued to use equipment from the 1920s and 1930s, notably the Babcock Tester, which is used to determine the fat content in milk; a cream tester; centrifuge; bottle holders; scales; and a cream can

washer. Three churns, complete with different drive systems and vats date from the 1940s, 1950s and 1960s. Other original equipment of differing vintages provides evidence of how dairy technology and procedures changed from the 1930s to the 1980s. When the Creamery closed in 1987, it was one of the last farmer-owned creameries operating in Alberta.

In many ways, the Donalda Creamery is typical of small-scale creameries in Alberta. The co-op's Board of Directors based the creamery's layout on observations of other creameries and on the recommendations of the Provincial Dairy Commissioner. The Donalda Creamery is a wood-framed, gable roofed building with a shed roofed addition. Two vented cupolas top the gable roof for extra ventilation, important in creamery buildings. The stepped, boomtown front on the south elevation makes the creamery an impressive presence on the street, and the three entrances facilitate the easy movement of workers, customers and cream can deliveries. Inside the creamery has an efficient layout with a clear demarcation between the building's functional areas. The main gable roof covers an open processing area, a cold storage room and a testing laboratory. The shed-roofed portion contains the creamery office, water pump and boiler room with coal storage bin. The importance of sanitation in creameries is demonstrated by the easily-cleaned surfaces, including the concrete floor with drains, tin-clad walls and ceiling and sealed light fixtures.

Notice is hereby given that sixty days from the date of service of this Notice and its publication in Alberta Gazette, the Minister of Culture and Community Spirit intends to make an Order that the site known as the:

Doukhobor Prayer Home, together with the land legally described as:

Plan 2177S, Block 15, Lots 14 to 16 inclusive, excepting thereout all mines and minerals

and municipally located in the Municipal District of Pincher Creek No. 9, Alberta be designated as a **Provincial Historic Resource** under section 20 of the Historical Resources Act, RSA 2000 cH-9.

The reasons for the designation are as follows: The heritage value of the Doukhobor Prayer Home lies in its identity as one of the few remaining Doukhobor buildings remaining in Alberta and as an excellent embodiment of the historical development of the province's Doukhobor community.

Originating as a protest movement against the ritualism and materialism of the Russian Orthodox church, Doukhoborism emphasized the inherent divinity of every person as the primary guide to human fulfillment. As such, Doukhobors unequivocally rejected the taking of human life. Persecuted by the Tsarist government for their radical commitment to pacifism, the Doukhobors sought a new land in which to live out the precepts of their faith. Aided financially and organizationally by Count Leo Tolstoy and other sympathizers, the community was allowed by the Russian government to emigrate. The Doukhobors initially investigated Beaver Hill Lake southeast of Edmonton as a possible settlement destination, but their migration was barred, in large measure due to the vigorous opposition of Frank Oliver, Editor-in-Chief of the Edmonton Bulletin. Having secured concessions from the Canadian government on vital issues relating to their pacifism, rejection of oaths, and desire to live communally, more than 7000 Doukhobors emigrated from the Transcaucasia region to present-day Saskatchewan in 1899. It was the largest group migration to Canada in our nation's history. They hoped to found a society in Canada inspired by their awareness of the godliness of each human being. They preached a simple faith dedicated to solidarity and a community made holy through toil and peaceful life.

From the start, there were divisions within the Doukhobor community around issues of accommodation to North American culture. Private property ownership and taking the oath of allegiance necessary for gaining title to land were particularly divisive. Some asserted that all lands must be held in common in order to cultivate true Christian solidarity, others asserted that individual ownership should be permissible, provided that the owners continued to participate in the Doukhobors' communal life. These internal divisions were aggravated in 1907, when Minister of the Interior Frank Oliver established a commission led by Methodist missionary John McDougall to investigate the state of Doukhobor landholdings in Saskatchewan. Disturbed by the Doukhobors unorthodox religious life and their failure to abide by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act, McDougall recommended that all Doukhobor lands not conventionally acquired be thrown open to settlement. Many Doukhobors refused to file individually for their land or to take the oath of allegiance necessary to acquire a homestead. These individuals were dispossessed of their land.

More than half the Saskatchewan Doukhobors relocated to British Columbia. There they established several colonies and prospered. Success led to the creation of new communities, including the first Alberta colonies established in 1915 in the Cowley / Lundbreck area. Buoyed by a robust internal economy within the community that saw goods shipped between the colonies in the three western provinces, the Doukhobors continued to grow. The murder of the Doukhobor's leader, Peter the Lordly Verigin, in 1924, the economic hardships of the Depression, internal fragmentation during the 1920s and 30s, and the suspicions and antagonism of some of Alberta's political and social leaders devastated the community and led National Trust and the Sun Life Assurance Company to initiate foreclosure proceedings against Doukhobor communal assets in the three prairie provinces in order to secure a relatively small debt. This act effectively ended the Doukhobors ability to hold land communally.

The Doukhobor Prayer Home in Lundbreck is a remarkable building that embodies the tensions between the traditional and the modern, radicalism and accommodation, communalism and individualism, in Doukhobor culture, particularly after the devastating 1938 foreclosure. The prayer home is a simple structure constructed of modern materials and resembling a typical period community hall. Its lack of embellishment is consistent with the Doukhobors' rejection of religious iconography, but the building lacks the meticulous, lively woodwork that distinguished earlier Doukhobor buildings and embodied the community's commitment to sanctification through work. The interior space is separated by two banks of benches that divide men and women. As the earliest Doukhobors were largely illiterate and their worship services were devoted to the singing of hymns, there are few books present in the building. The wall features a number of documents – including documents registering the Doukhobors and their prayer home under state law, as well as several community certificates of achievement – that speak to the tendency of mid-century Doukhobors to engage the larger culture.

(Insurance Act)

APPENDIX

The maximum amount recoverable as damages for non-pecuniary losses for all minor injuries sustained by a claimant as a result of an accident occurring during the 2010 calendar year is \$4,518.

This amount is based on the annual change in the Alberta Consumer Price Index (CPI), and is calculated using the following formulas:

- (a) The annual change in the Alberta CPI was calculated to one-tenth of a percentage point using the formula $X = (A-B) / B$ where:

X is the annual change in the Alberta CPI;

A is the sum of the 12 individual monthly CPI indexes for the 12-month period ending on September 30, 2009;

B is the sum of the 12 individual monthly CPI indexes for the 12-month period ending on September 30, 2008.

- (b) The result in (a) is multiplied by the 2009 minor injury amount and rounded to the nearest whole dollar to derive the increase in the minor injury amount for 2010.
- (c) The increase in (b) is added to the 2009 minor injury amount and rounded to the nearest whole dollar to establish the 2010 minor injury amount.
